AN ACT to provide Supplementary Appropriation for the services of Antigua and Barbuda for the year 2019

ENACTED by the Parliament of Antigua and Barbuda as follows —

1. Short title

This Act may be cited as the Supplementary Appropriation (2019) Act 2022.

2. Supplementary Appropriation of the sum of Two Hundred and Twenty-three Million Five Hundred and Thirty-three Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirteen (\$223,533,913.)
