



BERMUDA

GOVERNMENT OMNIBUS (FARES) REGULATIONS 1952

SR&O 48 / 1952

[made under section 9 of the Public Transportation Act 1951 and brought into operation on 1 August 1952]

Citation

1 These Regulations may be cited as the Government Omnibus (Fares) Regulations 1952.

Interpretation

2 (1) In these Regulations—

“adult” means a person who has attained the age of sixteen years;

“authorized agent” includes a postmaster, postmistress or ferry contractor duly authorized by the Board to sell tickets and issue transfers;

“child” means a person who has attained the age of five years but has not attained the age of sixteen years;

“handicapped person” means a person who satisfies the Board that although he is able to get on and off an omnibus unaided, he is suffering from a physical or mental disability to such an extent that—

(a) his earning capacity is restricted; or

(b) he is wholly or partially dependent upon some other person for financial support;

“monthly pass” means a pass issued by or on behalf of the Board for the duration of a month;

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“multi-day pass” means a pass issued by or on behalf of the Board for the duration of less than a month in respect of any journey;

“quarterly pass” means a pass issued by or on behalf of the Board for the duration of three months;

“school” means any school or other educational institution approved by the Minister of Education;

“special person” means a person of or above the age of 65 years who is resident in Bermuda or a person who satisfies the Minister that he is suffering from a disability, whether physical or otherwise, which hinders him from embarking on or disembarking from a bus unaided.

“student” means a person bona fide attending any school on a full-time basis as a pupil or student;

“student pass” means a pass issued free of charge to—

(a) a student in school in Bermuda; or

(b) a Bermudian who is not above the age of 18 and who is a student overseas, for a fixed period, in respect of any journey;

“ticket” means a zone check issued to an intending passenger by or on behalf of the Board entitling him to make a journey in respect of which the ticket has been issued;

“token” means a metal disc purchased from an authorized agent by an intending passenger for deposit in the fare-box;

“transfer pass” means a pass which entitles the holder to transfer from one omnibus to another in order to complete the journey for which he has paid;

“zone”, in relation to a route upon which Government omnibuses are for the time being operated, means a subdivision of that route of approximately two miles in length delimited by the Board.

(2) For the purpose of this regulation, “Bermudian” means a person who has Bermudian status under the Bermuda Immigration and Protection Act 1956.

Savings

3 (1) Nothing in these Regulations shall have effect with respect to the charges or fares falling to be paid in respect of the carriage of passengers in any Government omnibus which has been chartered or hired for that purpose.

(2) Nothing in these Regulations shall have effect so as to require the payment of any fare in respect of the carriage of any of the following persons in any Government omnibus—

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- (a) any blind person;
- (b) any officer or employee of the Board;
- (c) a student or child on production of a student pass; and
- (d) a special person on production of a special transportation identification.

Fares

4 Fares for the carriage of passengers in Government omnibuses shall be as set out in the Schedule.

Use of tokens

5 Passenger may use a token for deposit in the fare-box as defined in regulation 2(1) of the Government Omnibus (Fares) Regulations 1952.
