TRAFFIC SIGNS AND SCHOOL CROSSING PATROLS REGULATIONS

(SECTION 92)

[Commencement 8th July, 1961]

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Traffic Signs and School Crossing Patrols Regulations.

2. When between the hours of eight in the morning and six in the evening a vehicle is approaching a place in the road where children, on their way to and from school, are crossing or seeking to cross the road, a school crossing patrol shall have power, by exhibiting a traffic sign of the form, plan and character shown in diagram 1 of the Schedule hereto to require the person driving or propelling the vehicle to stop it.

- 3. (1) A person shall be required to stop a vehicle —
- (a) before reaching a school zone shown in the form in diagram 2 of the Schedule where children are crossing or seeking to cross so as not to stop or impede their crossing; and
- (b) the vehicle shall not be put in motion again so as to reach the place in question so long as children are crossing or seeking to cross.

(2) A person who fails to comply with these regulations commits an offence and is liable on summary conviction to a fine of two hundred dollars and is liable in respect of any further or subsequent offence to a fine of five hundred dollars.

4. (1) A school crossing patrol shall be a person Application appointed by the Controller of Road Traffic in consultation with the Commissioner of Police and the Director of Education to patrol in accordance with arrangements made under regulation 1 of these Regulations.

(2) For the purposes of these Regulations, where it is proved that a sign was exhibited by a school crossing patrol, it shall be presumed to be of a size, colour and type prescribed, or of a description authorised, under the foregoing provisions of these Regulations, unless the contrary is proved.
