

THE UGANDA ACT

Act
36 of 1964.

[9th October, 1963.]

1. This Act may be cited as the Uganda Act.

Short title.

2. In this Act—

“commencement of this Act” means 9th October, 1963;

“Minister” means the Minister responsible for external affairs;

“Parliament” means the Parliament of Jamaica.

3.—(1) On and after the commencement of this Act, all existing law, that is to say all law which, whether being a rule of law or a provision of an Act of Parliament or of any other enactment or instrument whatsoever, is in force on the date of such commencement or has been passed or made before that date and comes into force thereafter, shall, unless and until provision to the contrary is made by Parliament or some other authority having power in that behalf, and subject to the following provisions of this section, have the same operation in relation to Uganda, and persons and things belonging to or connected with Uganda, as it would have apart from this subsection if Uganda had not ceased to be part of Her Majesty's dominions.

Operation

(2) The Minister may, by order, make such adaptations in any enactment passed before or after the commencement of this Act, or in any instrument having effect under any such enactment as appear to him necessary or expedient in consequence of Uganda having ceased to be part of Her

Majesty's dominions; and any such order may, though made after the commencement of this Act, be made so as to have effect from the date of such commencement.

(3) Every order made under subsection (2) shall be subject to negative resolution.
